

I work at Hulen and Bellaire. I was going Northbound on Hulen Street. I was in the middle lane. There was three vehicle stopped at the red signal. I got out in front of the other two vehicles. The man on the motorcycle came around me on the left. He then moved back to center lane.

When I saw the Suburban it was at the median moving real slow eastbound on Arbor Lawn across Hulen Street. The motorcycle hit the right front of the suburban. The man flew over the hood of the Suburban, landing in the shrub near the house on the Northeast corner. The motorcycle the last I saw of it was in the street. I did not see it hit the post.

I was in the center lane and could not stop. I drove on and turned around went back to the accident. I went to two houses on the Northwest corner of Arbor Lawn. I could not get anyone to come to the door. The police arrived I gave them my name and address. There was several people working with the man so I did not go up to him.

The man when he pass me was wearing a helmet, trave: approximately 45 to 50 mph. I did not hear a horn before th accident.



BC This interview is being conducted at the home of Mr. Dan Moseley at 2104 Jacot Lane on 7-26-85.

Mr. Moseley, if you will, tell me in your own words what occurred the morning of November 6, 1984 at approximately 7:45 as you recall it.

DM Well the best I can recall, my friend and I were on our way to work -

BC Who is your friend?

Uh, Mr. Paul Shay. And Mr. Shay was driving a pick-up truck. We were coming down Interstate 20, turned off, DM going North on Hulen and as we were proceeding, uh, up Hulen, I believe it was after oh, maybe a - a block or two, when I passed by a man on a motorcycle, uh, who was going uh, somewhat faster than the surrounding traffic. noticed that he was going between our truck and uh, another vehicle just opposite us in the next lane. And uh, we remarked at the time that uh, it seemed that he was in quite a bit a hurry. And uh, he disappeared on over the rise, as we continued to go North. Uh, after that I resumed my reading in a magazine that I had with me at the time. And uh, the next thing I realize Mr. Shay remarked that uh, he had been hit. Uh, the man on the motorcycle, hit. And uh, I was kinda disoriented when he said that and looked around to know what was going on, uh, but as it had turned out, the collision had already occurred. And uh, the victim had already been thrown clear of his motorcycle and was lying under some Pitinea bushes, uh, in the front yard of a man's home on the corner of Hulen and uh, I can't recall the name of the street, the intersection. At which point we pull our truck over beside the road and uh, just past the scene a few feet, and uh, got out to see if there was anything that we could do to render any assistance. Uh, when I first noticed the man he was lying still underneath the bushes, motionless. But as we began to approach him he began to thrash around, uh, from side to side. And uh, as we got closer we heard him moaning and talking. And I knealt down to the bush and uh, noticed that his right

arm was bent at a very odd angle. Uh, no I'm sorry, it was his left arm. And uh, I suddenly realized that uh, he had been - he received uh, some very severe injuries from having a collision with a vehicle. And also that his left leg was immobile. I also noticed that there was blood flecked on his face and he was doing quite a bit of gurgling. So evidentally he had some broken ribs and a gurgling. punctured lung. So at that point I did not try to move him or touch him in any way, uh, for fear that we might further complicate his injuries. And uh, instead we roused the owner of the house and told him to call the police and get an ambulance. Uh, it wasn't more than about a minute or so after that I went back to the man, and uh, he seemed to be choking and asked me to remove his helmet for him. So we unsnapped his helmet while supporting his head and uh, encouraged him not to move around any further, for fear that he might further puncture his lungs or in some other way cause his injuries to become worse. He began to breath a little more freely at that time and became a little more lucid and understood the situation and lay still. He quit - uh, he quit trying to fight the pain evidently that was overpowering him. And we kept assuring him that help was going to be coming on the way. So he uh, began to talk to us, uh, he didn't relay any information that was very meaningful, just that he was in a lot of pain, and wanted to know what was wrong with his arm, uh, why he couldn't raise his leg, he - he was conscious of his injuries. Uh, at that point I notice that there was a lady standing behind us, uh, South of us, parked across the street, who was uh, driving a Suburban, uh, Van. And the Suburban, as I recall, was silver and blue. Uh, maybe there was some white mixed into it, but she seemed to be very agitated and I uh, she did not approach the man, but offered, or inquired if there was anything at all that she could do. Uh, at that point the police arrived and uh, he asked if he told us that the paramedics were on their way. About that time a fire truck came up and they began to take over, uh, doing everything they could to assist the man. At that point we uh, were told that there wasn't anything further that we could do, and so we got back into our pickup truck and resumed our way back to work.

- BC This time that you were at the scene, did you hear the lady say anything to the police or anyone else?
- DM Uh, no sir, I wasn't standing close enough to overhear any conversation between her and the police or anyone.
- BC O.K., and the victim, was as you said, in pain? Was there any outcry from him?
- DM Uh, yes sir.

- BC And what was that, do you recall?
- Uh, he was just crying out about uh, his injuries, and uh, wanting to know what happened to him. Uh, evidently, when the collision occurred, it happened so quickly that he didn't he didn't see uh, the vehicle uh, approaching him when the collision occurred.
- BC This is just a summation on your part, is that correct?
- DM Yes sir, just summation.
- BC O.K. Did you did not see the collision?
- DM No sir.
- BC Did the man at any time ask you, you know, about any of his injuries, or was he, was his outcry loud or soft or how do you describe that?
- Uh, he seemed to have quite a bit of strength uh, he wasn't weak. Uh, so he wasn't screaming by any means. He uh, evidently, uh, well I shouldn't use that word, uh, he may have been experiencing some shock, I don't know, but he did realize that his arm was he was unable to use his left arm. It was hurting quite a bit. He talked about it more than any of his other injuries.
- BC O.K. And he was in quite a bit of pain at this time?
- DM Yes.
- BC Is there anything else that you can recall in the incident, that anyone might have said at the scene that comes to mind?
- DM Uh, none of the parties involved, uh, there were other motorists who stopped later and wanted to know if they could offer assitance, but -
- BC Anyone that might have seen the accident -
- DM No.
- BC that you -
- DM No sir. As far as I know Mr. Shay and I and uh, the lady in the Suburban uh, were the only ones who stopped, and the surrounding traffic uh, just after the collision.

BC O.K. This has been recorded with the permission of Mr. Moseley and interviewed by Bill Cole. Thank you very much.

Additional questions in the interview with Mr. Moseley, Mr. Moseley, let me ask you at approximately what speed were you and Mr. Shay traveling at the time?

- DM I believe we were moving at about 40 miles an hour.
- BC Alright, and estimated speed of the motorcycle, of the person on the motorcycle?
- DM When he passed us, I would estimate he was going about 55 miles an hour.
- BC He was going that -
- DM Yes sir, that rapidly.
- BC that rapidly. O.K. Would you describe his travel North bound also?
- DM Yes.
- BC O.K.
- DM He passed us on the left side. I believe we were in the right hand most lane uh, the outside lane going North.
- BC Alright. Thank you very much.

BC This interview is being conducted by Bill Cole with Mr. Shea. Mr. Shea, if you will, give me your full name, and your address, phone number, and then if you will sir, just give me your version of what occurred on November 6, 1984, at Hulen Street and Arbor Lawn where an accident occurred between a motorcycle and another vehicle.

PS My name is Paul Shea. I live at 2042 Jacocks Lane. Uh, that morning, I was headed to work North on Hulen Street, I was coming off of 820 and as I entered Hulen Street I noticed behind me a motorcycle, it was a couple of vehicles behind. He pulled out into one of the left hand lanes to pass the cars behind me and I could see him, and he - he just came out of the left lane and as I saw him coming I thought I wish he hadn't done that. Anyway, he came on around the other vehicles and came on passed me, uh, I was going approximately 40 miles an hour at the time, and uh, went on up ahead of me, passed me and passed a few other vehicles and pulled back in the right hand lane. Uh, again, maybe as many as two or three times he went into the left lane, went up, and went back into the right hand lane, passing vehicles. Uh, as we approached Arbor Lawn, we uh, I happened to notice a vehicle, uh, stop at a stop sign in the far left hand side of Arbor Lawn, and uh, the vehicle, the motorcycle at that time uh, was quite a distance up ahead of me but I don't remember seeing any vehicles between us. And I could see out of my left corner of my eye the truck coming across uh, all six lanes of traffic, and I could see the motorcycle at the same time and I said oh no, she's gonna hit him. And at that time my uh, partner in the truck he was looking at a newspaper, he looked - well he looked up afterward but about the time when I said that, sure enough uh, the lady, uh, came across all six lanes of traffic and hit the young man on the motorcycle and he went flying up into the yard and at that time we pulled over to the side of the road and uh, rendered what aid that we could at that time until the emergency vehicle got there.


- BC Alright sir did you when the motorcycle passed you, did you estimate approximately what speed he was driving, or riding the motor?
- PS I was going probably between 35 and 40 as I was moving on to Hulen there, and uh, I would say he was going between 40 and 50. Uh, probably 45 or 50 because he was going faster than I was. So I'd say between 45 and 50 I don't I couldn't say he was going faster than that, but he was going faster than 40.
- BC Alright. When you saw the lady coming across Hulen Street, did she stop at the median, or did she continue across all the lanes without stopping?
- PS No, she did not stop in the middle, she was trying, it looked like to me, to come all the way across at the time.
- BC Alright. After you saw the collision, did you stop and go to the young man on the motorcycle?
- PS Um hum. The lady had already stopped over there on Arbor Lawn. She had gone into the uh, house to call the ambulance. And as soon as we got there we just uh, we were, I don't know, uh, a hundred yards or so behind, as it happened, and then we just pulled over to the side of the road and just went right up to him. And uh, I don't there were some joggers around there or who they there were several other people at that time, but I don't remember exactly who they were.
- BC When you were tending to the young man did he say anything to you?
- PS Uh, he was moaning you know and groaning because of you know the accident and everything and uh, he asked us to take his helmet off. Uh, if he was hot, or if you know, his neck was hirting or what, but uh, I remember him saying that. Maybe possibly his leg was hurting too or something like that or his arm, I can't remember for sure about that.
- BC Was his moaning was it loud like he was hurting -
- PS Yea like he was really hurting, he said "Ooooh", you know.
 He was he was in pain.
- BC O.K. Did you hear the lady or see her there at the scene?
- PS Uh, the lady who was driving the vehicle the truck there was another lady with her she was standing out

Body is viewd and case dictated 11-6-84 from 2:45 to 3:00 p.m. For biographical information regarding the deceased, please read the report of Mr. McMillan.

At the time of examination, the body is accompanied by cut-away articles of clothing including brown denim pants and white briefs.

EXTERNAL EXAMINATION :

The body is that of a normally developed apparently well nourished and well hydrated adult white male appearing near the given age of 20 years. The body length is 70 " and the estimated weight is 200 lbs. (91 kg.). Lividity is markedly reduced posterior non-fixed and purple and rigor is very slight in its development.

Oral endotracheal tube is in place at the time of examination and intrevenous lines are in place in the right external jugular vein and volar right forearm. A foley catheter without attached bag is in place.

The calvarium is symmetric and intact to palpation and the scalp is intact and covered by short wavy dark brown hair. The external auditory canals are free of foreign material. The eyes are brown and are without arcus. The pupils are 7 mm. and equal and the conjunctivae are pale and minimally edematous. There are two small paired abrasions up to $1/4 \times 1/16$ " of the right forehead and there is 1/4" diameter abrasion of the lower forehead with an adjacent $3/4 \times 1/4$ " abrasion. There is a non-patterned abrasion of the upper lip. The nose exhibits distal septal fracture. The buccal mucosa and lips are pale and thr oral cavity contains a small amount of blood stained mucoid debris. There is a sparce mustache and chin beard of only a few days duration present. There are multiple oral mucosal contusions and the buccal mucosa and lips are otherwise pale. The face, neck, larynx, and hyoid are symmetric and intact to palpation and the trachea and larynx are mid-line and mobile.

The anterior chest and abdomen are of unremarkable contour. There are palpable defects only underlying a sternotomy-laporatomy incision measuring 22" extending from the suprasternal notch to near the symphysis pubis and there is a metal sutured 18" left thoracotomy following 5th intercostal space. Sutured chest tube insertion sites are seen in the mid-axillary regions bilaterally over the 5th intercostal spaces. There is a contusion of the soft tissues of the right axillary. The abdomen exhibits a mottled contusion up to 4" in diameter in the left mid-abdomen. There are linear contusions measuring 1 x 1/4 to 3/8" along the lateral hip and these are located 1 1/2" center to center. The external genitalia are normal adult male with a circumcised penis and the testes are descended and without masses or atrophy. The pelvic girdle is intact to palpation. The perineum and anal orifice are unremarkable. The back is symmetric and intact to palpation.

The extremities are symmetric. There is a non-patterned 1 x 3/4" abrasion of the lateral upper left arm with an associated linear 3/4 x 1/8" abrasion on the anterior upper arm. There are small contusions of the lateral and anterior upper arm up to 1 1/2" in diameter. There are non-patterned abrasions over the dorsal forearm and hand and there is a superficial laceration overlying the 4th

metacarpal phalyngeal joint. There is irregular contusion of the forearm on both the dorsal and volar surfaces up to 4 x 7" and there is associated comminuted fracture of the radius and ulna. The right upper extremity is intact to palpation and exhibits an intravenous line on the dorsal surface of the hand and on the volar forearm. The nailbed of the hands are pale. The left lower extremity exhibits rectangular abrasions measuring up to 1 1/2 x 2" in maximal dimension located in the upper 3rd of the thigh. There is a massive hematoma of the thigh in association with a comminuted middle 3rd femoral fracture. Non-patterned abrasions are seen on the anterior knees bilaterally. There is evidence of prior amputation of the left great toe with a 3/1" scar. The nailbeds of the feet are pale.

30 ml. of blood, 5 ml. of vitreous humor are reserved for toxicology.

On 031898 Wednesday Deputy Wesley Mackey #135 was dispatched to a deceased person at 109 McCullar Rd. Burleson Tx 76028. When Deputy Mackey arrived at the scene he saw the Careflight Aircraft taking off from McCullar Rd. with the victim, Daniel Clark, 18 yoa. Deputy Mackey went inside the residence and spoke with Donald Clark (father). Deputy Mackey observed blood on Donald Clark's face and pants. Donald Clark is a fireman for the City of Ft. Worth. Donald Clark stated that he and Daniel Clark had a verbal argument and he told Daniel Clark to pack his bags and leave. Daniel Clark went outside the residence and came back in. Donald Clark was outside washing Daniel Clark's vehicle, which had been stuck in the mud the night before by Daniel, when he was alerted by his wife, Bobbie Clark, that something was wrong. Bobbie Clark could hear Daniel Clark breathing inside the bathroom, but could not get him to respond. Bobbie Clark was to upset to be questioned at this time. Donald Clark forced the bathroom door open and found Daniel Clark lying in the floor. Donald Clark stated that he owned a .38 pistol and that nothing had been disturbed in the bathroom. Donald and Bobbie Clark left the residence to go to Harris Hospital. Donald and Bobbie were joined by Lonzo Wallace, Deputy Chief Ft.Worth FD, who had came to the residence after the shooting. Deputy Mackey also spoke with Nayden Darter (aunt) who had been at the residence since 031698, Monday. Nayden Darter stated that she did not hear the gunshot, but told the same story about the argument and Daniel Clark being upset and going into the bathroom. Billy and Lynda Clark (grandparents) came to the residence after the shooting, but before Deputy Mackey's arrival. Deputy Mackey looked inside the bathroom on the north side of the home and saw a large amount of blood nest to the toilet and a blued revolver on the floor. Deputy Mackey also went into Daniel Clark's room where he noticed an apparent suicide note on the night stand.

Deputy Mackey had the aunt and grandparents wait in the livingroom area and did not allow anyone into the bathroom or Daniel Clark's bedroom, until the detectives could arrive. However, when Deputy Mackey went outside to signal the arriving detectives as to which home it was, Lynda Clark went into the bedroom while she was talking on the cordless telephone. Deputy Mackey viewed the bathroom and bedroom and did not see any changes compared to when he first arrived.

A PARTIAL MUZZLE IMPRINT IS PRESENT FROM 6 TO 9 O'CLOCK. THE WOUND IS CONSISTENT WITH A CONTACT ENTRY GUNSHOT WOUND. THE EXAMINATION SHOWED THAT THE BULLET PASSED RIGHT TO LEFT UP AND FRONT TO BACK THROUGH THE RIGHT TEMPORAL BONE RIGHT TEMPORAL LOBE AND ENDS IN THE LEFT PARIETAL LOBE. DR. 



Prioritizing Prisoners for Vaccines Stirs Controversy

AUSTIN, Texas — When he walked out of the H. H. Coffield Unit, a prison in Anderson County, Texas, in mid-August, Barton Gaines left behind a world gripped by sickness and death.

The COVID-19 pandemic struck the Texas prison system during the final months of Gaines' 18-year sentence for an aggravated armed robbery conviction. He thought he had been

spared when he turned up negative on one of the frequent coronavirus tests administered to inmates, but just days later, he recalled recently, "I felt like a truck ran over me."

Gaines, 38, was immobilized for about a week in mid-summer with aches, allergies and flulike symptoms. He never tested positive for COVID-19, but he is convinced he was infected with the virus, which was sweeping through his dormitory and other parts of the East Texas prison unit.

"Just about everybody in the dorm got it," he said. "Seems like all the bosses were getting it too."

Since the start of the pandemic nearly 10 months ago, more than 27,000 inmates and 7,700 staff members and officers in the 100-plus-unit Texas prison system have contracted COVID-19. Although most of them have recovered, at least 177 inmates and 33 prison employees have died. The Texas Department of Criminal Justice announced five more inmate deaths on Dec. 16. Five prison employees died within a 6-day period through Jan. 3.

The very nature of jails and prisons—people living in close quarters with restricted movement and limited options for social distancing—has made them more susceptible to the coronavirus than much of the rest of society. But even though long-awaited vaccines are finally at hand, prisoner advocates fear that public antipathy toward inmates and politicians' reluctance to make them a priority will delay or restrict the drugs' arrival behind bars.

"The fact that people in prison have been convicted of a crime should not deprioritize their need for an important public health measure like the vaccine," said Jennifer Scaife, executive director of the Correctional Association of New York, a nonprofit authorized to investigate conditions inside the New York prison system.

Scaife and other advocates say the vaccines are desperately needed inside prisons and jails. Approximately 20% of all inmates in state and federal prisons have been infected, a rate more than four times as high as that in the general population, according to a recent analysis by the Associated Press and the Marshall Project.

Nationwide, at least 275,000 prisoners have been infected and more than 1,700 have died, according to the report.

Anthony Petty Jr., who spent 30 years in prisons on a murder conviction before his release from the central detention facility in Washington, D.C., on Dec. 11, recalled in a recent telephone interview that he and his fellow inmates lived in constant fear of contracting the potentially lethal disease.

"Everybody was afraid of it because it was killing people," said Petty, who was first incarcerated when he was 15 and spent his adult life behind bars. "But at the same time, we had nowhere to go, so we just got to deal with the situation."

Like other inmates in his unit, Petty said he kept his mask on, washed his hands and faithfully complied with other protocols. "You did the things you were supposed to do and hope, inshallah, it doesn't come to you," Petty said.

As states began administering the COVID-19 vaccine last month—often in high-profile photo-ops—the first recipients were health care workers and long-term care residents. Few questioned their position at the front of the line.

But a nationwide review of state plans for administering vaccines in prisons found wide variations among the states. According to the study, conducted in early December by the Prison Policy Initiative, a nonprofit research and advocacy group, at least 38 states addressed incarcerated people in their vaccine plans, but most of those states prioritized prison staff over incarcerated people, and 11 states appeared to have no plans for incarcerated people at all.

"What this tells us is that most states are not thinking very hard about the challenges that people in prison would face right now," said Wanda Bertram, a spokesperson for the Prison Policy Initiative. "The impact of COVID-19 has been massive. It's been absolutely devastating."

So far, seven states (Connecticut, Delaware, Maryland, Massachusetts, Nebraska, New Mexico and Pennsylvania) have designated inmates as top-priority "Phase One" recipients for vaccines, according to the Prison Policy Initiative's December survey. New Jersey has begun vaccinating inmates and staff at the state's largest correctional facility, and other facilities are expected to follow suit.

The federal prison system will offer vaccines to prison employees, but has no immediate plans to inoculate prisoners, the Federal Bureau of Prisons said in a press release.

The plan for the more than 120,000 inmates living behind the walls of the massive Texas prison system, one of the largest in the country, was still unclear early this week. The Texas Department of State Health Resources, which will oversee the distribution of vaccines in the state, has designated people who are incarcerated as "vulnerable," but hasn't disclosed their place in line.

Sharon McKinney, director of programs for the 1,900-member Texas Inmate Families Association, a nonprofit advocacy group, said it would be "a big mistake" not to prioritize inmates along with staff members in a vaccine regimen. But perhaps an even greater concern to families, she said, is ending the 10-month-ban on prison visits that began with the pandemic. "It's been horrible," she said.

Colorado Controversy

A dust-up involving two prominent public figures in Colorado underscored the political sensitivities of putting prisoners ahead of other groups on the priority list for vaccines.

After a draft version of a state vaccine distribution plan appeared to put incarcerated people ahead of seniors not in prison and residents with certain health maladies, Republican District Attorney George Brauchler took a public swipe at Democratic Gov. Jared Polis.

"As the son of a 78-year-old father, I ask this: What in the hell is Gov. Polis doing?" Brauchler wrote in an opinion column published Nov. 29 in *The Denver Post*.

During a joint news conference with National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases Director Dr. Anthony Fauci on Dec. 1, Polis was asked to respond to Brauchler. "That won't happen," Polis said, according to the *Post*. "There's no way that prisoners are going to get it before members of a vulnerable population."

In an emailed statement to *Stateline*, Polis' press secretary Conor Cahill said the governor believes Colorado has a "moral obligation" to put "frontline health care heroes" and all seniors, whether they are incarcerated or not, at the front of the line.

"Inmate status will not make a difference in terms of timing of receipt of the vaccine," Cahill said. "Someone who falls into a category for early priority of the vaccine and is in custody will receive the vaccine at the same time as someone in the same category who is outside our correctional facilities."

But inmates and their advocates say they deserve to be in the first group to be vaccinated.

Christopher Blackwell, 39, an inmate at a Washington state penitentiary who is serving a 45-year sentence for a robbery and murder he committed in his early 20s, argued in *The Washington Post* that he and other inmates have not been sentenced to "suffer or die from a virus." In an impassioned op-ed published on Dec. 11, Blackwell said prisoners "ought to be near the top of the list" if the standard for dispensing the vaccine "involves helping the most vulnerable."

More than two dozen members of Congress, led by Rep. Robert C. "Bobby" Scott, a Virginia Democrat, are also advocating for a change in the federal prison policy to allow for vaccinations of inmates.

"To put the matter in perspective, the virus is moving through the prison population three times faster than it did on commercial cruise ships at the start of the pandemic," the U.S. House members wrote in a letter to the directors of the Federal Bureau of Prisons and the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"To deny priority vaccination to individuals in forced confinement is to abdicate our responsibility at a time when the public has called for a reckoning of the criminal justice system and racial injustice."

Some Inmates Wary

But even if the vaccines are made available to prisoners, many inmates may balk at getting the shots. Scaife of the Correctional Association of New York said that when her group asked inmates at one corrections facility whether they would take the vaccine, "only about half of the hands in the room went up."

Bertha Johnson of Waterloo, lowa, whose 30-year-old son is imprisoned on gun charges, said that she doubts that he would get the shot if it becomes available and ventured that at least some of his fellow inmates at the lowa State Prison in Fort Madison share that attitude.

"A lot of them down there don't want to take that shot," Johnson said in a recent telephone interview. "They're afraid of the side effects."

Scaife and others said the prisoner reluctance also reflects an inherent distrust of prison health care among many inmates, particularly among prisoners of color.

"I think there is this very real perception among some people in prison, particularly people who have been in prison for a long time," she said, "that prisons are not to be trusted with their health."
